

## **6** Principles of Black Lives Matters in Schools



Talking to young children about the Guiding Principles of the Movement for Black Lives

Guiding Principles	Child Friendly Language
Restorative Justice	We know that if you hurt somebody, you have to help them
	feel better; you cannot just say, "Sorry," and walk
	away. We also know that it is important for kids to be able
	to make a better choice another time, and it is grownups'
	job to help them make better choices and to give them
	chances to do that. Another way to say that is restorative justice.
Empathy	It is so important to think about how other people feel,
	because different people have different
	feelings. Sometimes it helps to think about how you would
	feel if the same thing that happened to your friend
	happened to you. Another way to say that is empathy.
Loving Engagement	It is so important to make sure that we are always trying to
	be fair and peaceful, and to engage with other people (treat
	other people) with love. We have to keep practicing this so
	that we can get better and better. Another way to say that
	is loving engagement.
Diversity	Different people do different things and have different
	feelings. It is so important that we have lots of different
	kinds of people in our community and that everyone feels
	safe. Another way to say that is diversity.
Collective Value	Everybody is important, and has the right to be safe and
	happy, no matter what they believe, where they are from,
	or who they love. Another way to say that is collective
	value.
Black Men*	There are some people that believe Black men are less
	important than other men. It is important that Black and
	Brown boys are not suspended and punished because of
	the color of their skin. We also want to make sure that
	Black men are not arrested, hurt, or killed because they
	have Black or Brown skin.
